From the Rector:

May was certainly an exciting month for the Episcopal Church! I have frequently said that the Episcopal Church is a well-kept secret, because we Episcopalians don't talk very much about our amazing church. As our, now, famous Bishop Curry said, "We Episcopalians

aren't known for 'being loud and raucous'." However, it seems to me that our Presiding Bishop has put us on the map. Did you know that Episcopalian was the most googled term over the infamous wedding weekend?

We have an opportunity now to keep the Episcopal momentum going. It is the right time to tell our stories, develop our "elevator speeches," and share what a difference God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, and Grace Church makes in our lives. Bishop Curry has paved the way. Here are a few statements from his sermon that we can keep close to help us.

- Song of Solomon 8:6-7: Set me as a seal upon your heart, as a seal upon your arm, for love is as strong as death, passion as fierce as the grave, its flashes of flashes of fire, a raging flame. Many waters cannot quench love, neither can floods drown it out
- There's power in love. The reason has to do with the source. We were made by a power of love. And our lives were meant and are meant to be lived in that love. That's why we are here.
- Ultimately the source of love is God himself, the source of all of our lives. There's an old medieval poem that says, "Where true love is found, God himself is there." For God is love.
- There's power in love. There's power in love to help and heal when nothing else can. There's power in love to lift up and liberate when nothing else will. There's power in love to show us the way to live.

- Think and imagine; think and imagine a world where love is the way. Imagine our homes and families when love is the way. Imagine neighborhoods and communities where love is the way. Imagine governments and nations where love is the way. Imagine business and commerce when love is the way. Imagine this tired old world when love is the way, unselfish, sacrificial redemptive. When love is the way, then no child will go to bed hungry in this world ever again. When love is the way, we will let justice roll down like a mighty stream and righteousness like an ever-flowing brook. When love is the way, poverty will become history.
- When love is the way, the earth will be a sanctuary. When love is the way, we will lay down our swords and shields down, down by the riverside to study war no more. When love is the way, there's plenty good room, plenty good room, for all of God's children. Because when love is the way, we actually treat each other, well, like we are actually family.
- When love is the way, we know that God is the source of us all and we are brothers and sisters, children of God. My brothers and sisters, that's a new heaven, a new earth, a new world, a new human family.
- Teilhard de Chardin said that fire was one of the greatest discoveries in all of human history. And he then went on to say that if humanity ever harnesses the energy of fire

again, if humanity ever captures the energy of love, it will be the second time in history that we have discovered fire.

These are powerful words, describing a power greater than any we can imagine. While on the surface this love thing may appear easy, loving as God loves is one of the most difficult things we can begin to tackle; but tackle it we must, for that is where Jesus leads us.





