From the Rector:



Dear Friends,

I was catching up on some reading the other day and ran across a quote from Dorothy Day. If you are not familiar with Dorothy, she was a journalist, a social activist, who stood up for the poor, the homeless, the working person, was a co-founder of the Catholic Worker Movement and named a "Servant of God" by the Catholic church (a

precursor to canonization). She was also active in the suffrage movement, and was jailed in 1917 for her actions on behalf of the cause. She was a pacifist and practiced civil disobedience. She is referred to as a saint and a troublemaker. Dorothy is quoted often and the quote that stuck with me as I read is this: "We love God as much as the person we love the least." That is quite a showstopper isn't it? How can so much be packed into such a short statement?

What does that statement say to you? It caused me to wonder. I wondered about how I feel about people and how I feel about God. To me the God part is simple – I can never love God enough! To me God is this huge, embracing love that surrounds us every moment of every day, making the good better and the not-so-good bearable, constantly urging me to be kinder and more loving. So, knowing I am on a consistent learning curve with God, where does that leave me with people? Well, I think I am still working on that one. Our baptismal vows call us to "strive for peace and justice and respect the dignity of every human being." (BCP p. 305) Oh! How I want to do that all the time. Oh! How I fail so often! And then here comes Dorothy, reminding me of my shortcomings —"We love God as much as the person we love the least." Ouch!

So what to do now? Well, I had best be busy doing a better job of loving all people so that my love for God is not seen as lacking, but that is a hard one. It might be easier if I only thought about loving those who are close to me and I interact with frequently. That is pretty easy (although some days easier than others). What about those that are not a part of my life and my work? What about those I heartily disagree with when I read statements they have made? What about those souls that seethe hate and anger in the world?

What about those who hurt other people, either by omission or commission? If I don't love them, if I don't love them as I believe God loves me—what does it say about my love for God? What a conundrum! What a challenge!

As I ruminate on this dilemma it occurs to me that I cannot do this on my own. I need to turn to the God that loves me, shortcomings and all, and ask for the strength and clarity to be better at this loving thing. Maybe we not only help ourselves, but I wonder if it is possible that by our love we can change the level of hate in the world; if by our love we can open the way for God to soften hurting, hate-filled hearts?

"We love God as much as the person we love the least." What does that say to you? I hope you will take that thought into yourself and really wrestle with it. You may come to a completely different place with it than I did and that's OK. I hope that we can all come with one similar take-away from the statement and that is to be sure that our relationship with God, our love for God, is one of our highest priorities. I believe that as God becomes our priority, as that changes and grows us, we can learn to become part of the hard love, loving "others" better and therefore loving God more and more.

May our least loved be loved more than we can even imagine right now, so that our all-loving God will be loved with a love that is our priority and our all-consuming passion. I wonder how different our world will be when that happens?


I can't imagine not giving to the church since it has given me so much. Our pledge has been one of the first things we pay each month.

VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS

Highlights from the September 17 Vestry Meeting:

Election of Diocesan Convention Delegates

Delegates must be elected by Oct. 11 and certified by Oct 25. Dave Webster moved that Kathy Hill approach Sue Mancino, Phil Davis, Dave Zimmerman, Debra Zimmerman, and Tony Swisher, or others, about becoming delegates and alternates, to be confirmed by an electronic vote. The vestry approved this motion.

Senior Warden's Report

- Long Range Planning (LRP)
 - Signed Architectural Contract
 - How do we review contracts? The reviewers raised some concerns which were discussed by the Vestry. One concern is that our initial estimates that may have been low and should be discussed again by the Long Range Planning (LRP) Committee.
 - Additional questions the LRPC needs legal answers about are: Given the scale of the renovation, would we need to add a fire sprinkler system? And, If we install an ADA bathroom on the upper floor, are we then required to add one downstairs?
 - o The next LRP meeting is 5:30 pm Sept. 30.

Junior Warden's Report

- Follow up on Vendor Contract Checklist: Dave Ivey proposed that all contracts over \$10,000, and any contract at the rector's discretion, be submitted to the church's attorney for review. The vestry approved this motion.
- Snowplow contract: Only one contract was submitted on schedule. Cathy will follow-up so we continue to move quickly.
- Sewer repair: Ciro will do the repairs on Oct. 5.
 Phil Davis will guide them. The Green Room wall seems to have moisture where the drains have been leaking. The damaged area will not be replaced until after the sewer work is complete.
- Tree removal: Tracy Thompson at the Thompson Services accidentally cleared the chips from the previously downed trees: a truckload will be returned. Payment was held against the wood chips. The vestry agreed to pay Thompson Services for taking down the

- trees. There is a fair amount of wood from taking the trees down available for use. Tony will be cutting some.
- Exhaust fan from Lounge Restroom: Frank
 Burkacki needs to call Paul Fussner about the
 fan and the thermostats.
