From the Rector:



I, like Bishop Steven Charleston, whom I often quote, have a fondness for moonflowers. He says:

"The moon flower reminds me that some beauty is rarely seen. It is hidden by the shadows. Some people go through life and are not recognized for the grace they have shared. So I want to celebrate the moon flower in all of us. I want to acknowledge the beauty of every soul,

even if it only blooms when the light is low."

As I pondered these words, the beauty of the words describing the beauty of these glorious flowers, I thought of a conversation I was a part of recently that weighs heavily on my heart. I think this conversation falls under the "only blooms when the light is low" part of the quote. Bear with me while I tell you about it please.

I was in conversation with a person who has been a friend since I was fifteen years old. It is a friendship that I have treasured for these many years and that I am now struggling to maintain. While this person and I have always had differing views and approaches to many things, it never interfered with the friendship. Over the years we have both changed as people do with life experiences. I now find myself diametrically opposed to many of this person's views and positions which they express frequently, insistently, and loudly. I find myself struggling to keep my ears open and my mouth shut. I have to confess that I have not always been able to do so and, to my embarrassment, have been just as loud and insistent on more than one occasion.

So why, one might ask, do I continue to have conversations with this person? I have struggled with this question over and over. I believe that the answer is that Jesus calls me to "acknowledge the beauty of every soul, even if it blooms when the light is low"! I think this is similar to our baptismal vow to respect the dignity of every human being. I have also found that sometimes this is really hard to do! So—now what? I realized that if I want to maintain this friendship, I was the one who had to do something different. I have had to learn to change. While I have not changed my views or positions, I have learned to respond differently.

From the Rector, continued

There have been several things that have helped me change my response to this person.
Underlying everything is prayer, of course. I have found that it is not enough to pray for the person, but I needed to pray that I could change as well—change how I received information and how I responded.

The second thing that helped me was to remember a statement made by Brian McLaren at a seminar I attended in which he proposed responding to divisive statements by saying "I see that differently" and then taking time to think about a response, setting an appointment at a future date to talk. While that is a positive approach, it doesn't fit the bill all the time.

The third thing I am working on and hope to share in more depth with you in the future, is the discipline of civil discourse. I was made aware of a website https://www.revivecivility.org, that is a wealth of information. The organization, Revive Civility is dedicated to overcoming problematic, even hateful interactions between people who may not agree. They give advice and techniques on participating on social media, texting, individual conversations and group discussion that can result in respectful conversations.

For example, to remain respectful on social media their handout recommends checking for accuracy, avoiding insults and name calling, seeking information from different perspectives, walking away, and spreading respect. Sound pretty simple doesn't it? Sometime however, what is simple is getting caught up in the moment and letting it get away from us, sometimes unintentionally.

What I am hoping is that we can be open to learning a better way to be together when the going gets tough. I am hoping we can learn to listen and listen to learn – that we can find the kernel of truth or a place of agreement (no matter how small) in those hard conversations. It won't be easy, but then this following Jesus thing has never been held out as easy—just very, very good. Take some time to noodle around on the web site and plan to join in our work together to "Revive Civility," "to acknowledge the beauty of every soul, even if it only blooms when the light is low."

Many of you participated in the shopping weekend by being in the shoe department greeting families, and assisting the kiddos find just the right pair of shoes or boots. A final makeup shopping day was held on October 26, but the final count was not available by *Pace* deadline. Look for that next month. The staff at JCPenney were awesome. Two of the three counselors from the schools we served were present most of the weekend to meet and help their kids. The school counselors sent a reminder letter to the families who couldn't make the

first shopping dates in hopes of getting shoes or boots to as many children as possible.

VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS

Highlights from the October 15 Vestry Meeting:

Finance Committee Report

Long Range Planning Team decided to proceed with installing tri-phase power to the building. The Finance Committee has voted electronically to approve. Cathy Nash moved that the Vestry approve the Finance Committee's recommendation to spend no more than \$10,000 to install the tri-phase power. Dave Webster seconded the motion. The motion passed by acclamation.

Election of Diocesan Convention Delegates

Election of the delegates was certified by the Clerk.
Elected as per electronic vote: delegates: Peggy
Burkacki, Cathy Nash, and David Zimmerman,
Alternates: David Webster, Debra Zimmerman, and Ken
Hughes.

Senior Warden's Report

Long Range Planning Team:

- The team proposes placing cabinets in the area of the Narthex currently being used as a chapel to store the choir and acolyte robes while renovations are underway. A chapel will be maintained.
- Dave Ivey moved the Vestry reaffirm the previous decision to accept the renovation plans dated February 2, 2019. Cathy Nash seconded the motion. The motion passed by acclamation.
- Dave Ivey moved the Vestry approve signing the architectural contract as amended by Grace. Cathy Nash seconded the motion. The motion passed by acclamation.
- The architect has asked the city to concur with the interpretation that we do not have to create a second ADA bathroom or sprinkler system to complete our renovations.

Junior Warden's Report

- Our snowplow contract has been signed with Shannon Eshelman, including the revisions requested by the Vestry previously.
- Sewer repairs were completed on Oct 2.
- Dave Webster moved the rector's new office fuchsia with lime green highlights and large daisies. Kathy Hill seconded the motion. The motion was passed with great acclamation.
- Green room wall discoloration is probably due to moisture. Phil Davis is taking care of getting a moisture meter to monitor it. Building and Grounds team will wait a month before replacing the discoloration.
- There is wood available for the taking from the downed trees at the Rectory.
- Paul Fussner is getting an exhaust fan for the Lounge bathroom, and made repairs to the switches. One of the Lounge electrical heaters is broken, but the Committee suggested use only the one heater this winter. Mr. Fussner suggested either keeping the thermostat lower, as it's far away from the working heater. Dave Ivey moved that the Vestry buy a box to go over the thermostat. Kathy Hill seconded the motion which passed by acclamation.
- Kathy Hill asked about acquiring the doorstop for the ground floor door.
- Cathy is getting new bids for Rectory siding.

Rector's Report

- The Nominating Committee for new Vestry members is formed of those leaving the Vestry: Dave Webster, Peggy Burkacki, and Tony Frazier.
- License Renewal for Worship Leaders, Eucharistic Ministers and Eucharistic Visitors, requires completion of Safeguarding God's Children training. We're out of date as the August deadline was missed. Rose Anne will be scheduling the required training.
- Mother Rose Anne recommended attending the Undesign the Redline program at Trinity Commons.
- Formation Activities: Seminarian Noah Suttersich will lead a discussion about interreligious presentations after the 10:00 am service on October 19. Advent Lutheran in Mentor is having an interfaith dialog Tue,

October 29, at 6:15 pm. Noah will attend and invite others to join him. Noah is also looking to organize an interfaith discussion here at Grace in the future.

- Scout Badge achievement: Mason Gumto will present his project on October 27 during the announcements at the 10:00 am service.
- Mother Rose Anne is also involved in these activities outside the Parish:
 - Diocesan Council project on Spiritual Discernment. She's been helping design materials for lay ministry. This is a three-year project she's engaged with.
 - She's on the Diocesan Anti-Human Trafficking task force, and was just involved in a program in Akron.
- Continue to Give (our electronic donations platform) continues to present difficulties. Dave lvey now has the passwords. Dave also saw another church use professionally laminated cards for the pews with the Q code to allow donations easily. They could be created while Dave Ivey is setting up the back-end. Rose Anne suggested having cards that people can submit at the offertory for donations given electronically.
- The Grace 150th Anniversary 2020 Taskforce has had its first meeting primarily focused on brainstorming. The team's next meeting will be November 11 at 4:00 pm. Anyone is welcome to join the Task Force. Team members to date: Pat Newyear, Thora Scott, Ken Hughes. Jeanne Schupp, and Walt Iliff.
- Research is ongoing to identify a capital campaign consultant.
- Mother Rose Anne will assist in providing pastoral coverage for Breckenridge Village/Grace Woods for the next two months. Their Chaplain, Diane Walker, is retiring Nov. 1. Mother Rose Anne has been preaching at their Wednesday service the first week of the month. She will cover Friday service once in November and December, and will assist with pastoral duties.
- The 2020 budget process begins with asking the various teams to present their proposed budgets for next year in November. Mother Rose Anne will be making the requests for those proposals soon. December 17 is when

the Vestry meets and when they normally vote on the next year's budget.

Stewardship

The State of Grace and Stewardship Campaign kickoff was held Oct. 13. The theme was the Joy of Generosity. Pledge cards were distributed and were due back by October 27.

Outreach

- Evangelism and Outreach are considering supporting Friends of Recovery, an organization that helps people on their road to recovery from addiction, guided by Christ. It operates a home for men in Willoughby, and will soon open a home for women. The director of the organization, Dennis Anthony, will be here at Grace on November 10 during both the 8:00 am and 10:00 am services.
- Grace's Little Feet Ministry received 127 names from schools and has assisted 64 children with shoes. Oct 26 will be the last shopping day. The school counselors will provide reminders.
 There were 10 or 11 people from Grace at the shopping day.
- Outreach is looking into working with McKinley Community Outreach Center as they begin organizing Christmas gifts for the needy. We'll have our usual mitten tree, and food baskets as needed.

Worship

- Eighteen people (and several animals) attended our annual Pet Blessing at Grace.
- All Saints is coming up November 3. Mark sent out emails to have people bring in picture of their loved ones for the Narthex.
- Advent begins December 1. Noah will be making some liturgical suggestions for Advent.




State of Grace luncheon kicks off 2020 Stewardship Campaign
